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Background

Kwara State agricultural policy

To use agriculture as the pathway to socio-economic development by creating a class of commercial farmers who will utilise the large expanse of arable land and equitable climate with which the state is endowed

Strategies

- 1. Back-to-land programme**
- 1. Commercial farmers from Zimbabwean**

The overarching question

How are the Shonga farms land deals structured and governed, and what are their impacts?

Specific research objectives

- **Examine the structure and governance of the land deal involving Zimbabwean commercial farmers in Shonga**
- **Assess the impact of the commercial farms on adequacy of land for local farmers, employment, domestic food supply, inflow of investment capital and the environment**

Methodology

- 1. In-depth interview of key participants in the Shonga experiment**
 - Four senior level government officials in the ministry of agriculture**
 - Five of the 13 commercial farmers**
 - Eight local farmers who lost some land to the commercial farms**
- 2. Inventory of plant species in fallow areas close to the commercial farms**

The structure and governance of the land deal for commercial farms

- **MoU between the Zimbabwean farmers and
Kwara State government**
- **State support for the commercial farms**
 - **land**
 - **Infrastructure**
 - **Finance**
 - **Political**

Impacts

<u>Impact areas</u>	<u>Remark</u>
1. Land for local farmers	Minimal; no settlement relocation
2. Employment	Significant; 2000 at peak period
3. Technology transfer	New crops/farming practices
4. Domestic food supply	Cassava, soybeans, milk, poultry
5. Inflow of investment capital	Nil
6. The environment	Minimal
